

## DUBLIN ATTACK

### Bomb Thrown At Military Car In Crowded Street

At about midday yesterday a bomb was thrown at a motor-car containing two officers of the National Army which was passing through Aungier street, Dublin.

The missile was thrown from the corner of Longford street and exploded behind the car, none of the occupants of which were hit.

There was a crowd of shoppers and passers-by in the street at the time, three of whom, at least, were injured. the following being treated in the Adelaide Hospital after the occurrence:—

William Tobin, 10 Iveagh Buildings, bomb splinter in hip;

Mrs. Heron, 27 South Circular road, shoulder grazed by bomb splinter; and

Miss Annie Larkin, a young girl, 17 Charlemont street, wound in the right breast.

#### WOUNDED OUTSIDE CHURCH.

Tobin was walking on the footpath outside the Carmelite Church in Aungier street when he was hit. He collapsed in the porch of the church and was taken to hospital by soldiers, who arrived in a Crossley tender. He was detained in hospital, but his condition is not regarded as serious. The two women were able to leave after treatment.

Two supposed attackers are stated to have escaped through the church.

The bomb thrown was a powerful one and the explosion left several marks in the street.

After the occurrence crowds of spectators gathered at the scene and boys picked up pieces of the bomb.

Two officers of the National Army were fired at in Grafton street about 10.30 last night. The shots, which fortunately missed, are thought to have come from a side street. The officers did not return the fire.
